A test for the newcomers immediately after the inception of the programme reveals the status of students in the respective discipline. Based on the score obtained in the test, students are directed to attend bridge course offered by the Department concerned. Periodic tests conducted reveal the progression of the students. The result of the test is used as a parameter to categorize students for remedial classes for those who are weak and, enrichment classes for the fast learners. Besides, the performance in the internal exams conducted more than once in a semester also point to the progression of the students.

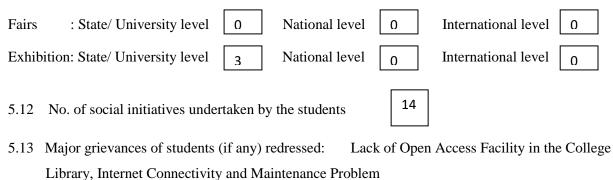
